Policy on Research Misconduct

All of suspect research misconduct cases related to the paper published in the Smart Computing Review (SmartCR) will be reported to and determined by the Steering Committee of SmartCR.

If the manuscript published in the KAIS Smart Computing Review is proved to be fabricated, false, plagiarized (or self-plagiarized), or accepted for publication in more than one journal or magazine, it will be declared invalid according to the following principles:

Clause 1. The paper previously published in other minor publications such as conference, workshop, seminar, or proceedings can be eligible for being reviewed and published in the Magazines. But we require that the paper be substantially revised with at least 30% new contents which have never been published in the previous publications. Even though the new results from the conference paper are not required, the revised manuscript version should include expansion of key ideas, examples, explanations, figures, tables, elaborations, etc. The manuscript should indicate its previously published conference name and date as a footnote in the left bottom of the first page. Authors very briefly indicate how the new submission offers substantial novel contributions beyond those of the previously published paper(s) or proceedings.

Clause 2. If a suspect manuscript is found, the Steering Committee can select the experts who are closely related to the area of the suspect manuscript. The selected experts will review the case and report their review comments to the Steering Committee.

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Clause 4. Delete the suspect manuscript(s) in the list of manuscripts provided by the SmartCR.

Clause 5. Detailed information on the suspect manuscript(s) may be given the SmartCR.

Clause 6. Details on the suspect manuscript(s) may be reported to other related professional/academic association(s)/societies and the dean of the school or the head of the department or the lead of the team with which the author(s) are affiliated.

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
